Although the flora and fauna of northern Africa, and of the southern Cape region, were known to early naturalists, the animals of the interior were not collected, identified, and studied until the nineteenth century, by such explorers as Sir Andrew Smith. Charles Darwin knew Smith, and was quite interested in the fact that so many large animals continued to survive on the savannas of Africa, while in South America, most of the large animals became extinct.

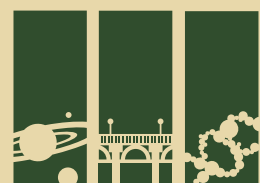
